GCSE SUCCESS!

During the summer, students celebrated a great set of GCSE results, with the rate of Grade 9s three times higher than last year!

The results show a significant improvement in the number of higher grades awarded with the pass rate in several subjects also increasing significantly.

Our top performers at the Academy included Erin Bradley, who achieved six Grade 9s in maths, triple sciences, geography, and food and nutrition. Sophie Bell achieved four Grade 9s in maths and triple sciences, a Level 2 Distinction* in creative media, and three other subjects at Grades 6-8.

GCSE RESULTS

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Alex Williams achieved three Grade 9s in chemistry, physics and French, as well as five other subjects at Grades 7 and 8.

Gregor Bennett achieved Grade 9s in English and physics as well as six other subjects at Grades 7 and 8.

We are delighted to have launched the Duke of Edinburgh's Award scheme with our Year 9, 10 and sixth form students.

The scheme is a fantastic opportunity for students to take part in a range of activities over the year including volunteering, developing a physical activity and learning a new skill.

At the end of the year students plan, train and complete an unaccompanied expedition which involves a minimum of two days and one night for the bronze award and three day and two nights for the silver award.

GENERAL ELECTION

On 12 December students participated in the Academy's own 'General Election' as part of their work on British values and democracy.

All students learned about the importance of the 'vote' in a democratic society as well as the major policies of the main political parties.

Students were also encouraged to learn about major issues including the economy, public services, the environment and Brexit. Everyone then experienced the feeling of casting their own vote to compare the school results to the UK's national results.

SOUTH AFRICA 2020

A group of students will be heading for the Kwa-Zulu Natal area of South Africa in June next year to take part in an 11-day expedition.

This amazing experience will see students undertake a threeday trek in the Drakensburg Mountains where they will hike, bike and canoe. They will then visit a local school to work with local children across a range of projects before heading to one of South Africa's largest game reserves where they will learn about animal conservation including: rhino, elephants, lions, buffalo, and giraffes. The journey will end on the coast with a visit to a crocodile sanctuary and a swim in the Indian Ocean before being treated to a traditional Zulu meal cooked by the local villagers.

We are delighted to announce that a similar visit is being

offered in 2021 to any student in Years 10 and 12. This time students will explore Cape Town and the south eastern 'Garden Route', taking part in whale watching, trekking, visiting a local school and undertaking conservation work.

We believe the expeditions are a unique opportunity to experience new environments and cultures as well as developing essential life skills such as leadership, working in a team, communication as well as determination and resilience.
