The trip was made possible thanks to a generous donation from Northumberland County Council, which will also be used to create a legacy project in rememberance of 100 years since the First World War.

They were then taken to one of the medical laboratories where they carried out a range of tasks such as learning how to tie surgical knots, practising CPR and handling equipment that would be used for keyhole surgery.

STUDENTS EXPLORE ROYAL IHC!

A group of Year 9 and 10 students were lucky enough to attend a tour of the local engineering company Royal IHC, in the Port of Blyth Harbour.

The students were given valuable information about the company and the work that they do in various sectors. Students also had the chance to see the J-Lay tower, an impressive piece of engineering and machinery which installs pipelines with the equivalent mass of 2000 cars, whilst dealing with the demanding environmental challenges faced at sea.

The tour allowed students to gain a better understanding of the world of engineering, the different trades and roles available as wel as understanding apprenticeship routes, in preparation for leaving school.

A group of fantastic writers have had their work chosen for publication this term.

TEAM HIGGS WOWS JUDGES AT UK SPACE AGENCY'S 'DRAGONS' DEN'

On Tuesday 26 June, five Bedlington Academy sixth form students headed to the UK Space Agency event, SatelLife, to present their winning idea to a panel of experts in a 'Dragons' Den' style event.

The students, named Team Higgs, won £5,000 in a national competition in April after developing an idea about using satellites to benefit humans. The idea called 'Displaced Persons Aid' focusses on the aftermath of a natural disaster. Many people who are forced to leave their home are overlooked while people

who are injured are supported. Their idea was to make an app and a website that tracks people who register themselves as being displaced using GPS signals to a satellite, enabling them to find places they can go for safety, support, food and supplies.

The event held at the Satellite Applications Catapult Offices in Didcot Oxfordshire allowed the team to gain valued feedback to help further develop their idea, from specialists in business, space and space applications.
