Storyline Online is an award-winning website that features actors and actresses reading children's stories on video. It's a program of the SAG-AFTRA Foundation, a nonprofit organisation that helps provide children's literacy programs to the public. Kevin Costner, Oprah Winfrey, Kristen Bell, Betty White, and Rami Malek are just a few of the readers in this program. The goal of each book is to strengthen comprehension and verbal and written skills and kids can follow along by reading subtitles. The videos also include glimpses of animated artwork too!


Another great site is Lit2Go – it has a huge range of free audiobooks, from classics to lesser-known titles – simply look, click and be carried away to a land of beautiful stories.




Engineers Making a Difference by Dr Shini Somara
