Children in England ranked fourth globally for reading

Primary school children in England have ranked fourth in the international rankings for reading, which is great news for our young people. The latest results in the Progress in International Reading Literacy Study - known as Pirls - saw England's rank jump from eighth to enter the top five. Based on tests taken every five years, the study places countries in a global education league table. The 2021 testing round assessed nearly 400,000 pupils in 57 countries. The government have pledged that by 2030, 90% of children leaving primary school should reach the expected standards in reading, writing and maths.

Queen Camilla opens library in first solo engagement since Coronation

Queen Camilla has opened a library in her first solo public engagement since the Coronation. As patron of the

National Literary Trust, the Queen opened the first Coronation library at Shirehampton Primary School in Bristol. 50 Coronation libraries will be created for children in communities with low levels of literacy in the UK and celebrate the Queen's advocacy for reading, literacy and primary school libraries. The project is in collaboration with the Primary School Library Alliance and the National Literary Trust (NLT) who work to improve the reading, writing, speaking and listening skills. Queen Camilla met pupils



schools at the school while they were taking part in an activity to create their dream library with author Cressida Cowell. Headteacher Louisa Munton said: "The library will harness their enthusiasm for reading even more, help them to continue to see the pleasure books bring. To see, first hand, the passion the Her Majesty Queen Camilla has for reading, and share with her the difference our new library will make to the school community was a privilege."


Tip of the month - The tricks that can turn you into a speed reader


"Liar's Beach" by Katie Cotugno
